COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENT

Warnbro Community High School, like many other schools, has seen a recent increase in young people vaping.

E-cigarettes, or 'vapes', are not safe for young people. They come in many shapes and sizes and can be hard to spot as they can look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks.

Key vaping facts

- Many vapes contain nicotine. Nicotine can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development, including impaired learning ability and altered mood, and can increase the risk of depression and anxiety.
- Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray, which can lead to serious lung diseases.
- Young people who vape are 3 times as likely to take up smoking cigarettes.

The laws around selling vapes

It is reported that young people often purchase vapes online, from retail stores or from friends and contacts in the community. However, it is illegal in WA to sell e-cigarette devices and nicotine vaping products to anyone regardless of age, unless they are prescribed by a doctor for smoking cessation purposes and obtained with a prescription from a pharmacy. You can report suspected illegal sales of vapes to the Department of Health by emailing **TobaccoPolicyehealth.wa.gov.au**.

Talk to your child about vaping

It's important to take the time to talk to your child about the risks of vaping. Try to start the conversation in a relaxed easy-going way, and remember your goal is to have a conversation, not deliver a lecture. Importantly, get the facts at: www.education.wa.edu.au/drug-education

Warnbro Community High School has been open on the site at Swallowtail Parade since 1995. The road is called Swallowtail Parade as there are flocks of swallows endemic to the area. At school, during spring, they can been seen making their nests in the nooks and corners of buildings. In this Bulletin we celebrate several staff members who have strong connections to the school and have been at Warnbro Community High School for a long time. My own teaching career started at Warnbro in 1995 the year the school opened on this site – although it had been running a year earlier from demountable classrooms at Rockingham SHS. The school had experienced a higher than expected number of enrolments and I started teaching English as a graduate teacher at the start of Term 2, 1995. At its peak the school had 1800+ students on site from Years 7 to 12.

Our Warnbro Alumni in this Bulletin, Claire Mead, was part of the second cohort to graduate from the school. I am proud to have taught Claire from Year 8 through to Year 12 and over the years, although we have had contact, I had no idea of the richness of her own career journey. It is exciting to read about the pathways that previous students have taken when your recollection of them is from much earlier years. We talk to Claire Mead who graduated in 2001

After graduating from WCHS, I got a job providing holiday relief as the receptionist at the Parole Board. I worked there full time while working at McDonalds in Warnbro one shift a week on the weekends. The Parole Board recommended me for a position at the Small Claims Tribunal and from there I worked at other Tribunals in a variety of roles, mostly doing secretary, supervisory and bench clerk roles. When I was 20 I took a year's leave without pay and travelled to England. I worked in the health and safety area of the London Fire Brigade and travelled around Europe. When I returned, I was working at the State Administrative Tribunal and heard they needed someone at the Attorney General's Office.

I went for an interview and was successful in getting the role. From there, I worked my way up, working for a number of different Ministers. I started in 2006 as Senior Correspondence Officer and worked my way up to Executive Officer, which is the highest admin position you can hold within a Minister's Office. I resigned from the Department of the Premier and Cabinet in 2018 so I could concentrate on finishing my University degree.

I completed a Cert IV in Government (Court Services) through Victoria University in 2010 and a Bachelor of Arts degree (Political Science and International Relations and History majors) through UWA in 2019.

After graduating from UWA, I obtained a permanent position at the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development as a Senior Ministerial Services Officer. I stayed in that role for about a year before applying for my current position as Executive Manager at the Office of Digital Government. When I finished school, I had no idea what I wanted to do. I'm lucky because with hard work I have just fallen into interesting roles and opportunities have come my way.

Any advice to your younger self or other currently studying at WCHS?

Study hard! You can always go back to study later in life but it's a lot harder as you've generally got more responsibilities than when you're young. University would have been so much more fun if I'd been the same age as the rest of my classmates or had attended with my friends.

My tips would be to think about what your dream role would be and then see what qualifications you need to get there, talk to people in the industry you want to work in and network as much as possible.

WA Public-Sector entry-level pathway

The WA Public Sector promotes itself to the public as offering flexible working conditions and innovative employment benefits.

The Public Sector Commission offers a range of programs and services to facilitate an entry pathway for a career in the public sector. Most of the programs on offer by the Commission target those 24 years and under, or current secondary or tertiary students.

To apply for entry level position with the Public Sector commission, you must:

- be an Australian citizen or permanent resident
- have completed a minimum of Year 10 schooling or equivalent
- be willing to get a National Police Certificate
- Other skills may be required

We are now focusing on presentation as students - creatively frame their artworks.










Year 8 Dance students have workshopped with choreographic devices to devise their own small group dances. They are also learning a Jazz routine in preparation for the Showcase.

Year 12 General Visual Arts Students have had their hands in the clay! They have made fantastic large scale pots and have refined their coiling and hand building ceramic skills this semester.

Year 11 General Visual Arts have focused on the explosive works by Jean Michel Basquiat and have created some explosive abstract paintings themselves, mixing collage, mixed media and paint to explore the theme of the "Discarded".

Year 11 ATAR Visual Arts explored the theme of differences through the ritual of the dinner table. Their painting skills have gone from strength to strength over the semester.

ADVENTURE RECREATION PROGRAM



On Monday May 16th the Year 7 Adventure Recreation students embarked on an excursion, which was led by Year 12 Outdoor Education students. Students spent what was a beautiful sunny day hiking in the Jarrahdale region. The Year 12 students used their navigation, group management and leadership skills to ensure all students had an enjoyable day. We finished up at Serpentine Falls for some lunch and spotted some local kangaroos. Everyone used their "Leave no Trace" skills to leave the area just as they found it, to ensure people can enjoy this beautiful region for years to come.

Year 8 Adventure Recreation

The class have been planning and running camp craft and outdoor recreation sessions. There has been a great mixture of topics covered so far, including; expedition cooking, leave no trace principles, finding and treating water for drinking in a remote location, first aid, and surf skating.

This semester the Year 9 Adventure Recreation program went surfing and is currently mountain biking. Surfing is the act of riding a wave towards the shore, standing on a surf board. To surf you need to have the right techniques and you need to find your centre of gravity. The average rating for surfing within our class is eight out of ten. When we went surfing we had a few flexi's. A flexi is when we do activities related to school outside school hours and then get to either leave school an hour early or arrive at school an hour late. While surfing someone said "I ended up falling on my butt and surfed better than standing", which everyone has done at least once. Someone else said "they were standing up on their board, when they were rammed into and fell on their back, ending up with sand down their bathers". Most of the days we went surfing the conditions were perfect, while some were horrible.

This term we have been going maintain biking. So far we have ridden to Shelton street, Long Point and Port Kennedy foreshore. Before we start riding, we have to complete the M check it is how we check that our bikes are in working order and are safe to ride on. First we start at the front, then work our way to the back, in the shape of an M. We must make sure the tires are pumped, the quick releases are against the frame, the brakes work properly, the bike seat is the correct height and is stable and the pedals are not loose.

People in the class think mountain biking is great and really fun. The favourite part of mountain biking is going downhill super fast. Some though prefer going up hill rather than downhill. On the 27th May we rode to Long Point and saw an absolutely spectacular view. When we stopped for a little break some of us went and played on the playground as if we were little kids again. On the way back to school we saw an adult kangaroo and a joey, which was really cool. **Leah Year 9 Adventure Recreation student**

Year 11 ATAR Outdoor Education Expedition

The Year 11 ATAR Outdoor Education class recently planned and conducted a 3-day expedition in the Margaret River Region. The class was divided into three groups, each was responsible for the events of a day. The first day involved a packed hike from Redgate Beach to Conto Camp Ground.

The students were treated to some favourable weather conditions and some of the great views that the region has to offer. The second day was a 20km cross-country mountain bike ride from Conto Camp Ground to Boranup Lookout. The planned route involved a range of different tracks with some intense downhill sections. The forest had a bush fire go through approximately 6 months earlier. Although this created some unique scenery, there was a large amount of erosion making some track sections very challenging. The last day the students were treated so some great surfing conditions at Augusta. There were dolphins in the water and some very long waves to enjoy, over 100m. The expedition was very successful, the level of planning, organisation, cooperation, and leadership that was demonstrated by the students is a great testimony to their capabilities as young adults and leaders.

SENIOR SCHOOL UPDATE

EST Update

Term 2 is traditionally a busy one for senior students and this year is no exception. All students in a General Year 12 course took the Externally Set Task (EST) developed by the School Curriculum and Standards Authority in Weeks 3 and 4. Students reported feeling a little nervous before each assessment, but confident that they understood what topics each task would cover and how to complete them. Given the higher number of Covid related absences this term, we were given an additional week to catch up any missed assessments meaning some students were still completing their ESTs in Week 5. The EST is compulsory and forms part of the school-based assessment for the year with a weighting of 15%.

WACE Tracking

The Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) is the certificate that students in Western Australia receive on successful completion of the WACE requirements at the conclusion of their senior secondary education. It is recognised nationally in the Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF), by universities and other tertiary institutions, industry and training providers. Students typically complete a WACE in their final two years of senior secondary school and this term, I have been working with students in Year 11 and 12 to understand the requirements of the WACE and track how they are progressing towards it.

ATAR

Year 12 ATAR students sat their mid-year exams in Week 6 of this term and Year 11 students sit their exams in Week 7. The Year 12s have reported feeling quite relaxed and calm as they have a strong understanding of the exam process, while our Year 11s have reported feeling a little apprehensive. We have worked extensively with the students over the last two years to build an understanding of effective study habits and I'm confident that they will do well. The study tips from ReachOut.com provide some helpful ideas for students and parents.





Course Changes

Year 11 students seeking to make changes to their courses for Semester 2, must speak with Ms Simpson by Week 8 of Term 2. Year 12 students are no longer able to make changes to their courses in 2022.


