

How can it already be the middle of Term 2!!!

Our term started with a whole school commemoration of ANZAC Day. Holding a ceremony for the whole school, including the Warnbro Education Support School, was a proud moment as it showed us the best in our students – they attended with dignity and respect.

A key part of the journey through high school is about finding a successful future pathway for students to engage with. Our careers program, led by our Career Practitioner, is an important part of giving students opportunities to explore different pathways. Our Year 9 & 10 students have had some exciting opportunities to explore future pathways this term with guest speakers from Tourism Western Australia in to speak to students about the career opportunities in the tourism and hospitality industries here in WA, from Brick and Block and Construction Futures about the Construction Industry, what it has to offer and how many opportunities there actually are in different sectors as well as a beauty therapist talking about a very popular industry. Jodie from the Jobs and Skills Centre spoke to our Year 10 students about TAFE pathways and four Year 10 students have also taken part in the iWomen program with the Kwinana Industry Council, another about developing program understandings of industry pathways in our local area.

It has also been a term of firsts. We are excited to welcome Judy Punch, Marissa McCarthy, Isiah Walley Stack and Trish Collard to Warnbro CHS this term. As a part of our commitment to supporting our students Judy, Marissa and Isiah are supporting our Aboriginal students to connect to culture and journey successfully through school with the Stars Foundation and Bridiya programs.

Trish is an experienced Noongar Language teacher who has been developing a curriculum that builds culture, language and history as a part of our new LOTE program for Year 7 & 8 students. Already a positive impact on our students has been made and we are excited about all the opportunities that these new faces will offer our school community.

We have also welcomed a new partnership with the Australian Business Community Network (ABCN) who provide mentoring opportunities for students with corporate Australian businesses. Recently 17 Year 9 and 10 LEAP students attended a design thinking program with ABCN at Ernst and Whilst they were kept busy Young in the City. brainstorming solutions to everyday school problems apparently the view from the building on St George's Terrace was very distracting!!! All of these opportunities are available to our students because of the dedication of all of our staff. YEAR 11 AND 12 NEWS



Term Two is a notoriously busy time of the year and, for students in Senior School, it can be especially so. This term, in weeks three, four and five, all Year 12 students enrolled in General courses undertook the School and Curriculum Standards Authority's (SCSA) Externally Set Tasks (EST). These fifty-minute assessment tasks are developed by SCSA and deployed across the state to all students enrolled in a course. They are worth 15% of the student's grade for the year. The course content that will be assessed in the EST is released to teachers in Term 4 of the previous year meaning our programs can be reviewed to ensure key concepts are taught leading up to the tasks. Student feedback about the tasks this year has been positive with most students indicating that they felt well prepared.

At the time of writing, twenty-two Year 12 ATAR students had commenced their Semester One exams starting with the English exam on Monday 29 May. These students have worked hard over the last few years to prepare for the rigour and intensity of ATAR exams with most of the students coming through our LEAP program. Next week, 31 Year 11 students undertake their first full week of ATAR exams, and history tells us that this experience is formative in developing students' resilience and capacity to manage the competing demands of adolescent life. We have run a variety of workshops this year focussed on effective study habits and building resilience and we wish the students well.

Our Year 11 students are now eagerly awaiting the arrival of their 2024 Leavers Jackets which are due to arrive at the end of this term. Students who have maintained their good standing will be able to collect their jackets when they arrive and we are currently working to support students to regain their good standing if they have lost it. In other exciting news for our Year 11s, the final design for the 2024 Leavers Shirts has now been finalised and we are working with our supplier to prepare our order. This year, our Leavers Shirts have been designed by two students, Shakaya and Tsharn and we are excited to see our students wear them with pride when they arrive later in Term 3.

Week 10	COURSE COUNSELLING EVENING Dates TBA (proposed Tues and Wed evening) Parents/Guardians will be invited to book a 20-minute course counselling session, at a time that suits, with a Course Counsellor. Bookings will be made through Compass and details will be sent closer to the date.

ALUMNI

After graduating from Warnbro Community High School, have you completed any courses or what has been your experience since?

I went on to complete my Bachelor of Education at Edith Cowan University. Whilst doing my studies, I was able to work in local primary schools as an Education Assistant, both mainstream and with students that have additional needs.

On completion of your studies what have you been doing?

I have been teaching Primary school children for 11 years now. I have taught all year levels from Pre-Primary through to Year 7 (when they were still in primary schools). I have loved all year groups, however I am very passionate about teaching in the middle to upper primary years (4-6).

How did you decide on this path?

Whilst at WCHS, I was unsure if I wanted to be a paediatrician or a primary teacher. It was through support and guidance from Student Services and the teachers that I decided teaching would be the path I went. Being able to do Workplace Learning in Year 10 through to 12 in a primary school setting, I knew that is where my passion was.

Any advice on your younger self or to current students?

My advice to current students would be to not be put off if you at first you don't succeed. There are many opportunities that you will have, and it is important to make the most of them.

How to become a Primary School Teacher?

Teaching is a rewarding and dynamic career which gives you the opportunity to make a real difference in the lives of young people.

To become a teacher you need a teaching qualification which can be one of the following:

- a Bachelor of Education of at least 3 years in duration in one of the following areas
- Early Childhood Education
- Primary Education
- Secondary Education
- a relevant 3-year bachelor's degree, followed by a completed initial teacher education program such as a Graduate Diploma in Education or a 2-year Master of Teaching.

The minimum requirement for entry into a teaching qualification you will need to either get a 70 ATAR or complete a Certificate IV to complete alternative entry. For more information on how to become a teacher visit www.education.wa.edu.au/your-pathway/

"At the future thinkers excursion we did a few activities about design thinking, some activities were creating posters." – Ava P










Year 7 CASP Visual Arts

Students have completed their Creative Arts Production Company logos which will represent them for the next 4 years.

After learning and experimenting with the elements of art, the Year 7 students will be creating a combined painting based on the Welcome Swallow which roosts annually on the school grounds.





7 CASP Drama

In Year 7 CASP Drama we have started to look into how different rituals have been incorporated into theatre. Students have developed Dreamtime story performances based on local Noongar Dreamtime stories.







Year 8 CASP Studio

The Year 8 CASP Studio students have been working busily to finish off their clay self portraits so they can be ready for the first stage of the firing process. The works look fantastic and each person has represented themselves with unique flair.

Year 8 CASP Dance

Year 8 CASP Dance students have begun working in small groups to develop short narrative dances based on ideas brainstormed together as a class. We have also been adding to our whole class dance, which has three different parts showing different feelings in a relationship. On top of this we were lucky enough to visit His Majesty's Theatre to watch the WA Ballet perform.









Year 9/10 CASP Media

In 9/10 CASP Media this term, the students have been working hard to complete the production stage of their short films. They have all been working collaboratively to set up their sets, lights, audio and cameras, while focusing on applying their media knowledge such as the consideration for shot types, camera angles and mise-en-scene. The students will then move forward to their post-production stage, using thier captured footage and audio to create their final edited projects.








Year 9/10 CASP Visual Arts

Year 9/10 CASP Visual Arts students have been looking at the work of Teesha Moore, in particular her Art of Journal Making based on creating an artwork based on themselves. Students will further develop their painting skills through a combined portraiture piece.





Year 9/10 Drama

In 9/10 Drama students have been continuing to develop the scenes that they devised in the WAYTco workshops last term. To devise these scenes, students were asked to tell a story from their life and bend the truth to make their stories more theatrical. These stories range from long lost relatives, to a cousins adventure in outer space.





Year 9/10 Dance

The 9/10 Dance students have been non stop this term. They have had weekly visits from CO3 Dance company, who have taken them through contemporary workshops. The students have begun to expand on their spatial and body awareness while building contemporary choreography. The class has also begun to learn a group piece based on the story of Aladdin, choreographed by Gaby, Carolina and Rico. In addition to their busy class schedule, the 9/10 Dance students had the opportunity to view a live performance of Ballet to Broadway culminating their research task on the WA Ballet company.


The Performers Last Performance

The Performers consists of 11 Students and 2 staff, each guided by their spirit animal mentors, that's right, spirit animal mentors, don't you wish you had one too? The students consist of a Chihuahua, two Meerkats, a Rabbit, Husky, Lama, Snapping Turtle, Sly Seal, Golden Retriever, The Messiah, and a Wombat. The staff consist of a Gazelle and a Parrot.

The Performers planned and conducted a multi-leg remote expedition for their very last school camp. This involved 4 hiking legs and 2 kayaking legs from start to finish in Broke on the South Coast of Western Australia. The students remained self-sufficient for the 4-day duration of the expedition carrying all their chosen equipment and supplies for the duration.

Not only did The Performers survive, but they thrived. They thrived in challenging situations that most adults would not want a bar of. This ranged from physically challenging feats, problem-solving under time constraints, and managing expected and unexpected environmental conditions.




One Very Proud Teacher

IN THE MOMENT:

- Resist the urge to hit back- it just makes the situation worse.
- Step away from the screen for a couple of minutes to calm down
- Use your in-app functions to ignore, hide or mute the other person's posts or comments so you don't keep seeing them.



COLLECT EVIDENCE AND REPORT TO THE PLATFORM:

- · Tell a safe adult.
- Screenshot the messages.
- Report the account to the platform and take a screenshot.
- · Block the account.

- You can report the bullying to the e-cyber safety commissioner 48 hours after you report it to the platform if it has not stopped.
- Make sure your safe adult is aware so they can support you
- If the bullying doesn't feel like something you can handle, seek extra support from Student Services who can connect you with someone you can talk to.
