### **CASP NEWS**

As 2023 comes to an end so does the 2023 CASP Season. Our CASPies have had a busy year. We have visited North Metro Tafe for the 'Reel thing' excursion and road tripped to the city to watch the Ballet, collaborated with Comet Bay College for a dance workshop and presented our Semester 1 Showcase 'Our Story'. We have created artwork for NAIDOC Day, enjoyed WAYTCo Drama workshops and CO3 Dance Workshops. We have worked with Perth Academy of Performing Arts and Barking Gecko for skill development incursions, welcomed Sharon Meredith to facilitate projection photography workshops, had Art by Row visit for a Visual Art portrait incursion, had Studio pieces displayed in the Art Exhibition as well as KIC and finished the year on a high with our Semester 2 Showcase 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'.

Classes were a buzz in Term 4 in the lead up to showcase. All students were working towards projects that would be displayed for parents, guardians, friends and family over our 2 night run in the Sanbrook theatre.

In Year 7 Dance the students worked on a piece they devised as a class as well as a routine choreographed by the Year 11 General Dance students that was embedded into the traditional script of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. In Media the Year 7's used the showcase theme to design and capture their final photography portrait piece.

In Year 8 Drama our CASPies manipulated drama elements to perform a devised children theatre version of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' and in Media students created short films using the showcase theme as the prompt.

In the 9/10 Performance class our CASPie's were given the hefty task of learning the original Shakespearean script of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' for Drama. In Dance they learnt 3 devised pieces that were embedded into the play, to support the storytelling.

The 9/10 Studio Visual Arts students created self-portraits through dreamscapes, personal symbolism and aspirations. In Media students worked on their final task, an interactive photo booth installation for showcase that incorporated projection technology.

Showcase was a smash. The students really rose to the occasion, and we could not have asked for more. We are incredibly proud of our CASP family and the effort they put into making the Semester 2 Showcase one of the best yet.

### Year 10 South Coast Expedition

#### **Real Risk**

Toolbrunup Peak is considered to be the most difficult mountain to ascend in the Stirling Range and by many, in all of Western Australia. Although the trail is only 2km to the summit, the terrain is very challenging and there is a 540m elevation gain to reach the summit at 1052m tall.

To successfully summit this mountain, the students planned for and conducted themselves to the highest standard. They understood the gravity of the challenge and that to be successful, they would need to function individually and as a group to ascend the mountain safely.

The feeling at the summit was sensational a true achievement that can never be taken away from them. Also a great spot to eat lunch with views extending out across the range.



### **ADVENTURE RECREATION NEWS**

#### **Perceived Risk**

What feels dangerous is not always dangerous. Abseiling off a sea cliff is one of those things. Although for some people, it may be the most daunting thing they ever participate in. High quality equipment and safety systems ensure that the level of risk is very low. This does not change the fact that participants are still repelling off a sea cliff.

Abseiling at the Natural Amphitheatre near The Gap in Torndirrup National Park requires mind over matter. The students have been honing skills on the artificial wall at WCHS this year and this was the day that they would use this skills on a natural site, and quite an intimidating one. It's a 20m vertical descent into the amphitheatre, all the while there are waves crashing onto the cliffs, they are strong enough to spray you with mist while at the top.

There were some very nervous first abseils that day. However, repetition builds fluency and within a short time students had gotten past the fear in the situation and applying a variety of repelling skills after they abseiled time and time again. In the past, it has always been the students that have finished and wished to stop. This time, I kept calling for anyone else that was keen on another abseil, and they just kept coming including those who were petrified at the start.

#### The Last night

The last night of the expedition was at Shelly Beach in the West Cape Howe National Park. There was plenty of time for reflection and enjoying each others company for the last night of camp in the Adventure Recreation program. It was clear during the final debrief and through conversations at the camp site that these students have been on a journey. This journey has taken them from wherever, whoever they are now and whoever they are going to be in the future. The personal growth that I have seen over the last 4 years is inspiring.

Rand, Darcy, Ella, Leah, Maddison, Keenan, Aidan, Rogan, Jimmi, Oceana and Zac, I am truly proud of what you achieved on this expedition and the people that you are.

### **CAREERS NEWS**

Wow! What a busy year it's been. Since Term 1 we have had over 400 individual students from Years 7-12 engage with some form of Careers event outside of the classroom. These events have included a range of Year 9 Career Taster courses, guest speakers, advice sessions from the Jobs and Skills Centre, workshop and programs delivered by Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN) and Kwinana Industries Council (KIC).

In Week 5, we had 15 of our Year 9 and 10 students attend a Process Plant Operator Career Taster at Gilmore College's Peron Training Centre. Students learnt about hydraulically controlled machinery and created a hydraulic machine out of wood and water. This was followed by setting up a pumping station where students got very wet as they pumped water from one end of their table to another. The session finished with a look into a simulated processing station operation room. This was a great opportunity for our students to see what is involved in Process Plant Industry, as well as experience the PPO certificate that they could apply for in Year 11 and 12.

To finish off the year, 16 of our Year 9 and 10 students attended an 'Interview to Impress' Workshop held by the Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN). Students had the opportunity to learn about interview techniques and how to present themselves for a job interview. This was a great opportunity for some of our students to learn about answering interview questions with confidence and what employers look for in applications. Special thanks to Miss Kirkwood and Ms Pearce for taking students into the city for this great opportunity!

### **Partnerships**

Throughout 2023 we have been working with several organisations to assist us in delivering some amazing opportunities to our students. These partnerships will continue in 2024.

#### Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN)

The Australian Business and Community Network (ABCN) is a purpose-led, not-for-profit organisation that brings businesses and schools together to address educational disadvantage. They connect volunteers from member companies with students to provide fun, workplace-based mentoring programs that develop students' confidence, skills and aspirations vital for thriving in the workplace of the future.

In 2023, we had two workshops delivered by ABCN, including the Future Thinkers workshop which helped to build students problem-solving skills with design thinking and Interview 2 Impress where students learn interview skills to build confidence and interpersonal skills.

We wish to thank ABCN for their support this year and look forward to working with them again in 2024!

#### Kwinana Industries Council (KIC)

The Kwinana Industries Council (KIC) is a not-for-profit association with its membership drawn from the major industries and businesses in the Kwinana Industrial Area. They provide educational programs showing high school students the sorts of careers that are available in the industry, and working to show them how they might aspire to these sorts of careers.

This year we had 8 students in Year 10 attend one of the KIC iProjects which are designed to provide students an opportunity to further explore what career pathways may be available in the Kwinana Industrial Area.

KIC also provide Pre-apprenticeships programs over 2 years for Year 11 and 12 students. Students complete a TAFE qualification in either Electrotechnology, Engineering, Female Engineering and Heavy Diesel Plant Mechanics. We have 8 students joining the KIC Pre-Apprenticeship Program in 2024, 3 of these students attended the iProjects program this year.

This program has had a far-reaching impact on our students with students often finding employment after completing their Pre-Apprenticeship.

We wish to thank the KIC team and members for their support this year and look forward to working with them again in 2024!

### **Industry Links**

#### Workplace Learning

During 2023 we have had over 10,000 hours of experience completed by our Workplace Learning Students in years 11 and 12. These hours would not be possible without the generous support of our local companies and businesses. We would like to thank the following businesses for their support this year and we hope to continue working with you in 2024.

Starting in 2024, we will have three new certificate courses in year 11 at WCHS. These certificates are to assist students in gaining a VET qualification to assist in future employment or training.

#### These certificates are:

Certificate II in Creative Industries has an arts and creative industries focus. This certificate will develop students' skills and knowledge in the arts and creative industries including front of house duties and design processes.

Certificate II in Sports and Recreation has a focus on the practical parts of the sport, fitness, and recreation industry. This certificate develops the skills and knowledge needed to deliver a variety of sport and recreation activities.

Certificate II in Work Skills which is an entry-level position across a diverse range of business services and can open the door to a variety of employment opportunities. This certificate builds common transferable skills and knowledge required in almost any workplace.

We will also continue to offer the Certificate II in Hospitality, which offers students general Hospitality knowledge and a range of food and beverage service skills.
